The building houses teaching, research and events in the field of foreign languages and culture. This building also houses the Vigdís International Centre for Multilingualism and Intercultural Understanding. It operates under the auspices of UNESCO, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, and is affiliated with the Vigdís Finnbogadóttir Institute of Foreign Languages.

The Vigdís Prize honors Vigdís' exemplary leadership in the field of languages and culture. Simultaneously, it serves as a great reminder of our shared responsibility to safeguard and harvest the cultural heritage that is embedded in all the languages of the world.

The Vigdís Prize is an award conferred for outstanding contributions to world languages and cultures. It is awarded to individuals, organizations, or institutions to spotlight exceptional achievements in the promotion of cultural and linguistic diversity, multilingualism, and translation. Previous awardees are Jonhard Mikkelsen, a Faroese linguist, teacher and publisher, Katti Frederiksen, a Greenlandic linguist and writer, and Jürgen Boos, the President, and CEO of the Frankfurt Book Fair.
